Context



- **Homelessness Partnering Initiative Grant**
 - Federal funding administered by York Region
 - Transportation a Priority in the York Region Community Plan to Address Homelessness (2008)
- **\$65,000 awarded to YRAEH**
 - \$38,550 allocated to direct support
- **Contract Requirements**
 - Increase transportation access of 500 clients to services and supports
 - Inventory of existing transportation supports
 - 2 new sustainable transportation options

Process

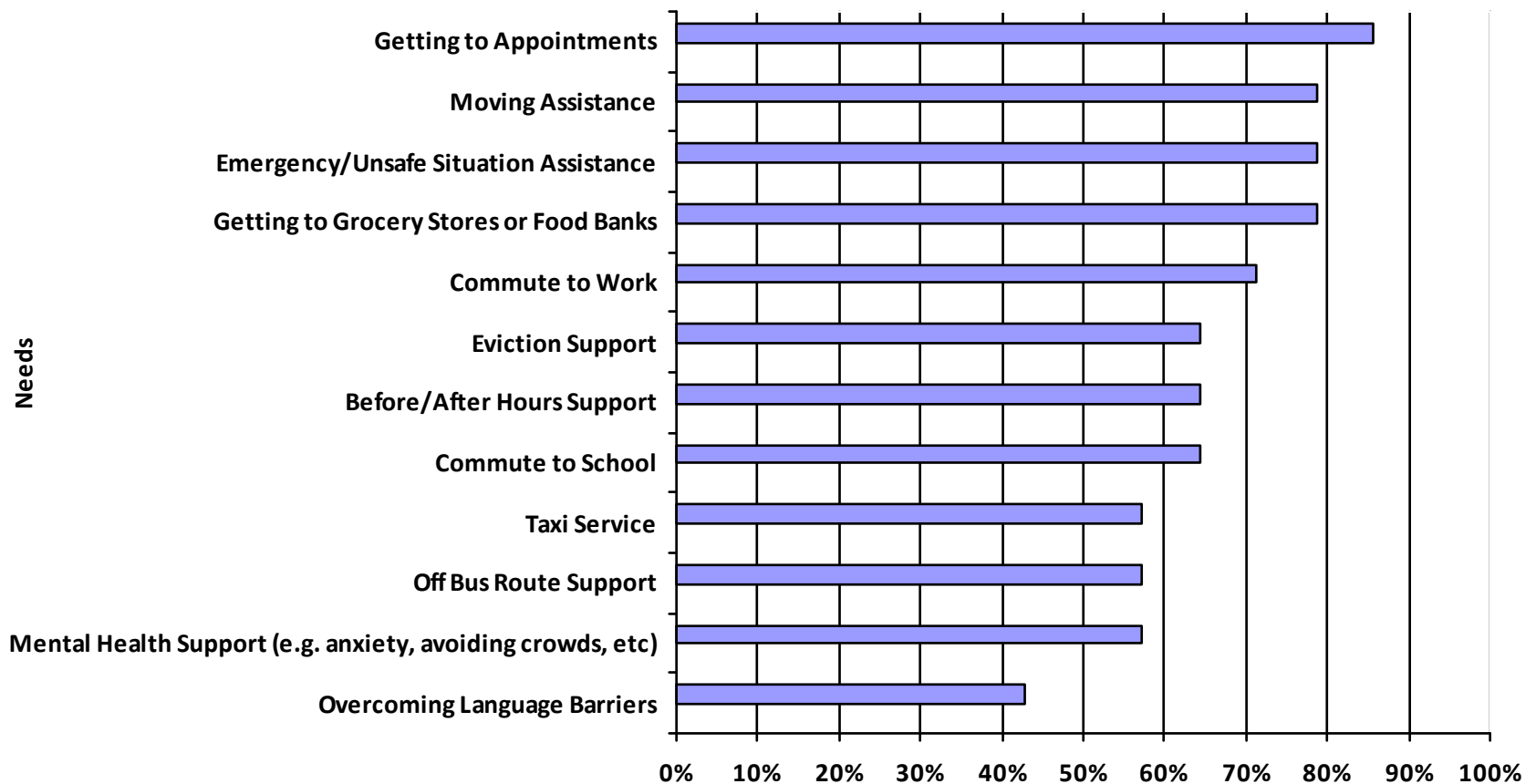


- **Transportation Working Group**
 - 12 organizations represented
- **Needs Assessment**
 - 14 Agency Surveys, 9 Community Group Surveys, 8 Focus Groups
 - Priorities: Housing, Education, Employment
- **\$38,550 allocated**
 - 10 agency recipients

Proportion of Agencies Who Identified Specific Transportation Needs:



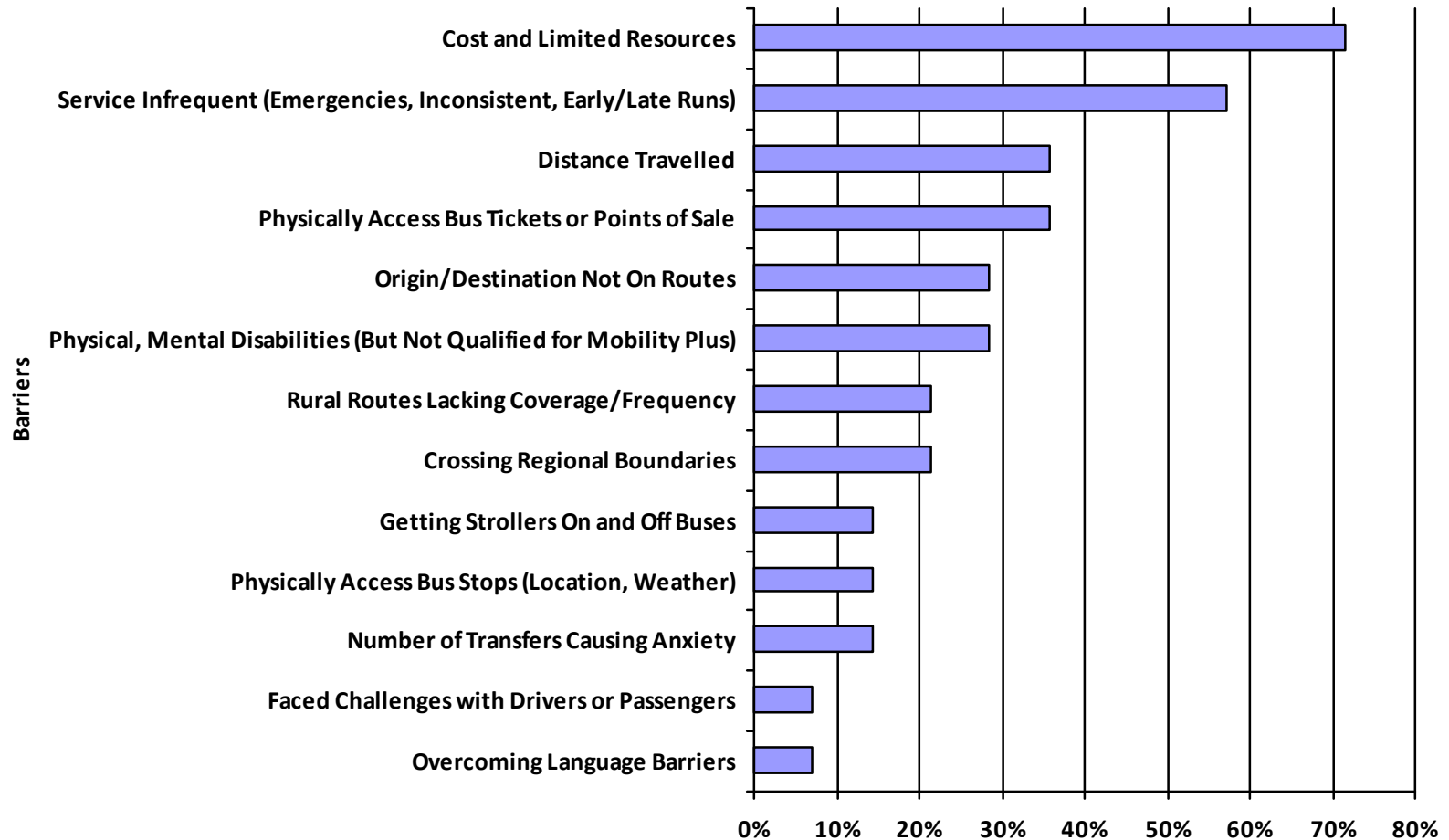

Focus Group Themes

Priority Needs

Housing Search	• Commuting with children is challenging and costly
Education	• Infrequency of buses in north discouraged youth from attending school if a bus is missed
Employment	• Cost of transportation difficult before receiving first pay cheque
Health	• If discharged from hospital after 10pm, youth cannot commute from Newmarket back to Sutton

Main Barriers

Affordability	• Transportation money is often used for essentials like food, shelter, and clothing
Access	• Walking down a long, soft-shouldered, gravel highway to access the nearest bus stop
Safety	• Walking long distance in hazardous conditions because buses infrequent or destination is off-route

Results



- \$38,550 allocated to direct support
 - 10 agency recipients
 - Focus on shelters and key drop-ins
 - Purchased YRT/Viva tickets, transit passes, mileage, taxis, moving support, 407/ETR fees
- 3132 rides provided
 - 2145 males, 1026 females
- Key Partnerships formed

Key Partnerships



- YRT/Viva
 - York Region Alliance to End Homelessness
 - Transportation Working Group Member Agencies
- Increased Agency Collaboration

YRT/Viva Partnership with the Alliance



- **Transportation Working Group**
 - Regular attending staff member
 - Response to Needs Assessment wish list
 - Notification of the YRT Community-Based Social Services Discount Pilot Program (15% discount to 12 programs)
- **myRide training offered to social service agencies**
 - Equipped staff to educate clients about local transit



YRT/Viva Partnership with Member Agencies



- Bus Stops at Emergency and Transitional Shelters
 - New bus stops at shelters
 - Upgrading bus stops at shelters
- Blue Door Shelters Dial-a-Ride Pilot
 - Previously a 2 km walk on Hwy 11 to the nearest stop
 - Residents can access transportation on weekends

Agency Collaboration



- Sandgate Women's Shelter and Transit Georgina
 - Created a partnership between neighbours
 - Children able to continue attending same schools
 - Women could more affordably attend school, search for jobs, and seek housing
 - Support for women when moving

The Future



- Homelessness Partnering Initiative (2)
 - Funding has been approved to extend this pilot for an additional 12 months ending June 2010
 - Beyond June 2010
 - No resources to sustain this critical initiative

Request for Involvement



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- YRT Community-Based Social Services Discount Pilot Program
 - 15% Discount Pilot ending this year
- Consideration of Best Practices
 - Calgary: 50% subsidized (\$41.50 vs. \$83.00)
 - Regina: 73% subsidized (\$15.00 vs. \$57.00)
 - Saskatoon: 71% subsidized (\$20.00 vs. \$68.00)
 - Ottawa: 62% subsidized (\$30.40 vs. \$81.00)

York Region Sustainability Strategy
